Disclosure & Disqualification Requirements

Pursuant to Government Code Sections 56100.1, 56300(b), 56700.1, and 81000 et seq., and Colusa LAFCO's Policies and Procedures for the Disclosure of Contributions and Expenditures in Support of and Opposition to Proposals, any person or combination of persons who directly or indirectly contribute \$1000 or more or expend \$1000 or more in support of or opposition to a change of organization or reorganization that has been submitted to Colusa LAFCO must comply with the disclosure requirements approved by Colusa LAFCO. These requirements contain provisions for making disclosures of contributions and expenditures at specified intervals. A LAFCO Commissioner must disqualify herself or himself from voting on an application involving an "entitlement for use" (such as an annexation or sphere amendment) if, within the last twelve months, the Commissioner has received \$250 or more in campaign contributions from the applicant, any financially interested person who actively supports or opposes the application, or an agency (such as an attorney, engineer, or planning consultant) representing the applicant or an interested party. The law (Government Code Section 84308) also requires any applicant or other participant in a LAFCO proceeding to disclose the contribution amount and name of the recipient Commissioner on the official record of the proceeding.

LOCAL AGENCY FORMATION COMMISSION COLUSA COUNTY MINUTES OF MEETING July 6, 2023

1. Call to Order/Roll Call

The meeting was called to order at 3:02 p.m. There was a quorum present.

2. Elect Chair and Vice Chair for FY 2023-2024

Commissioner Ash moved to elect Greg Ponciano as Chair for FY 2023-2024, second by Commissioner Bell, motion carried. 5-0 on a roll call vote

Commissioner Bell moved to elect Kent Boes as Vice Chair for FY 2023-2024, second by Ponciano, motion carried. 5-0 on a roll call vote

3. Approval of minutes from the June 1, 2023, meeting.

On motion by J. Bell, second by K. Dunlap, the commission approved the minutes of the June 1, 2023, meeting, motion carried.

- 4. **Public Comment** Ben King asked if the Colusa Basin Drainage District was required to follow the Lafco process. He believes following the Lafco process would be good for the district and its constituents. S. Browne will review the legislation and the issue will be brought back for discussion.
- 5. Consent Agenda
 - a. Payment of claims for the month of June 2023

On motion by G. Ponciano, second by K. Dunlap, the commission approved the consent agenda as presented; motion carried.

- 6. Correspondence
 - a. Letter from SDRMA John received a letter regarding insurance, for information only.

7. Continued PUBLIC HEARING for the GCID MSR and SOI

- a. Executive Officer's Alternatives Memo
- b. Review and discuss comments submitted re: the GCID MSR and SOI

- c. Provide clear direction to staff
- d. Continue public hearing to a date and time certain

John advised the commission that several of the letters received regarding the GCI MSR and SOI have not yet been reviewed by legal counsel. There is much information that still needs to be reviewed. Many valid comments have been received. John is not sure Lafco is the forum for review. He explained that these districts (GCID) do not contribute to the cost of Lafco, and it will cost money to review all of the issues. Some of the comments aren't germane to the MSR and SOI. These documents are barebones. Specialists are not hired to complete them. If anything is challenged, the cost to Lafco is unknown.

John reviewed the alternatives:

- 1. Hire a specialist, someone with experience, to complete the MSR and SOI,
- 2. Ask the county and Sustainable Ground Water Committee to address these issues prior to MSR update,
- 3. Request GCID to address all these issues before update,
- 4. Postpone indefinitely the MSR has been updated once or twice in the past 20 years and these issues were not raised,
- 5. Confer with legal counsel on how to proceed,
- 6. Other alternatives?

John received a letter yesterday requesting that government agency lands be included in the SOI. This is a reasonable request if they are providing water. Comments and backup information are posted on the website.

S. Browne stated that water quality seems to be the main concern of Mr. King and Scott is not sure it's an issue to be addressed by Lafco. The Sacramento Regional Quality Control board is the agency to contact; this is their sole focus. Lafco's focus is much more general. Letters should be sent to GCID asking them to respond to the issues. Hopefully, they will have answers that can be incorporated into the MSR.

Mr. King agreed with Scott's statement. It would be good to receive a response from GCID.

Scott stated that the sphere issue can be addressed, and consideration given to amending the sphere plan to incorporate additional acres. As to the other issues, the hearing should be continued, and letters sent to GCID asking them to respond regarding water quality issues. Comments received from GCID and Mr. King can then be incorporated into the MSR without having to hire experts ourselves. More discussion followed.

S. Browne suggested the commission refer back to staff to a.) explore whether the SOI should be expanded to include Federal Lands and b.) refer the letters we received on the technical water quality issues to the GCID and ask for a response.

B. Ash made the motion to continue this item to a date to be determined, second by G. Ponciano, motion carried. 4-0-1

8. Select a commissioner and alternate to vote on behalf of Colusa LAFCo at the Calafco annual Conference October 18-20

Continued to next Lafco meeting.

9. Annual adjustment to LAFCO Staff Hourly Charge-out Rates based upon the Employment Cost Index

Action: Adopt Resolution 23-05 approving the Annual Employment Cost Index Adjustment (4.7%) for LAFCo's Charge Out Rates

John advised the commission of the 4.7 % increase of the Employment Cost Index stating that if we don't keep current with our rates, the county and cities could end up covering the costs.

K. Dunlap moved to adopt Resolution 23-05 approving the Annual Employment Cost Index adjustment of 4.7% for LAFCo's Charge Out Rates, second by G. Ponciano, motion carried on a roll call vote of 5-0

10. A. Consider Amendment #5 to the Agreement for Executive Officer Services:

Action: Approve Amendment #5 to the Agreement for Executive officer Services granting a 4.7% cost of living increase based on the Employment Cost Index, as included in the LAFCo Budget

J. Bell moved to approve amendment #4 to the Agreement for Legal Services granting a 4.7% cost of living increase as included in the LAFCo budget, second by K. Dunlap, motion carried on a roll call vote of 5-0

The second item is several issues, concerns and comments were submitted to LAFCo in the attached letters and emails. The Commission is requesting a response to the concerns addressed in the letters.



West's Annotated California Codes Currentness Water Code Appendix (Refs & Annos) Chapter 127. Colusa Basin Drainage District (Refs & Annos) [™] Part 1. Introductory Provisions [™] Chapter 1. Short Title → § 127-1. Short title

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the Colusa Basin Drainage District Act.

§ 127-20. Legislative recognition of problems

Sec. 20. (a) The Colusa Basin Drain lies between the Sacramento River on the east and the Coast Range on the west within Glenn, Colusa, and Yolo Counties. It is bounded on the north by the watershed of Stony Creek and on the south by the watershed of Cache Creek. The basin has no natural outlet at times of high water in the Sacramento River. The two outlets available for floodwaters and drainage are outfall gates at the southerly end of the Colusa Drain near Knights Landing and the Knights Landing Ridge Cut. During times when the Sacramento River is high, the outfall gates near Knights Landing are inoperable and water can escape from the Colusa Basin only through the artificial channel known as the Knights Landing Ridge Cut through which water is discharged into the Yolo Bypass to enter the Sacramento River near Rio Vista. Limited outlet capacity and limited drainage and channel capacity within the basin result in periodic extensive flooding throughout the basin. This problem needs to be studied and addressed.

(b) Irrigation drainage occurs in the basin through a number of natural and artificial channels, all of which ultimately flow into the Colusa Basin Drain, sometimes called Reclamation District 2047 Drain, which discharges water into the Sacramento River through the Knights Landing outfall gates except during times of high water on the Sacramento River when the only outlet is through the Knights Landing Ridge Cut into the Yolo Bypass. The Colusa Basin Drain has been used for the purpose of receiving irrigation water drainage or return flows. As land within the Colusa Basin has been developed and improved, the capacity of this drain for drainage waters has become overtaxed to the point where irrigation water drainage is not available to lands adjacent to the drain at times when it is required for agricultural purposes, and flooding of adjacent lands may occur even during the normal drainage season. This problem needs to be studied and addressed.

(c) Certain areas within the Colusa Basin appear to be experiencing subsidence which may add to the flooding and drainage problems occurring within the basin. This problem needs to be studied and addressed.

§ 127-21. Necessity of special act

Sec. 21. The problems of flooding and winter drainage, irrigation drainage, and subsidence which are occurring within the Colusa Basin are multicounty in scope, but are unique to the Colusa Basin and are not general or statewide. A special act to address these problems is, therefore, necessary.

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§ 127-45. Work; works

Sec. 45. "Work" or "works" includes, but is not limited to, reservoirs, dams, and all conduits and facilities for the control, conservation, diversion, and transmission of water for beneficial uses; drains, levees, and all ditches and facilities for the control and disposal of drainage, storm, and flood waters within the district; associated power facilities for the incidental generation and distribution of hydroelectric power; and all necessary property interests and rights-of-way.

§ 127-46. Zone

Sec. 46. "Zone" means a zone of benefit formed under Part 6 (commencing with Section 600).

§ 127-50. Application of other provisions

Sec. 50. The Cortese-Knox Local Government Reorganization Act of 1985 (Division 3 (commencing with Section 56000) of Title 5 of the Government Code) does not apply to the formation of the district or the formation or changes in the boundaries of any zone. For all other purposes, the district is a "district" as that term is defined in the Cortese-Knox Local Government Reorganization Act of 1985.

§ 127-51. Judicial actions or proceedings; limitations

Sec. 51. Any judicial action or proceeding to attack, review, set aside, void, annul, or challenge the validity or legality of the formation of a zone, any contract entered into by the district or a zone, any bond or evidence of indebtedness of the district or a zone, or any assessment, rate, or charge of the district or a zone shall be commenced within 60 days of the effective date thereof.


The action or proceeding shall be brought pursuant to Chapter 9 (commencing with Section 860) of Title 10 of Part 2 of the Code of Civil Procedure.

The district may bring an action pursuant to that Chapter 9 to determine the validity of any of the matters referred to in this section.

§ 127-200. Number of directors; selection

Sec. 200. The district shall be governed by a board of directors consisting of nine directors. The nine directors shall be selected as follows:

- (a) Three directors appointed pursuant to Section 201.
- (b) Three directors selected pursuant to Section 202.
